EMPLOYMENT CLAIMS DISCREDITED.

Cuadrilla have continued to quote the analysis of employment potential in shale gas which the company itself funded! This is despite the fact that a new report halved the original figures. Even the Daily Telegraph (*January 2014*) had a leader on the Government's "over-hyping" and the damage this did to the economic case for shale gas.

LANCASHIRE EMPLOYERS SEE THE THREAT

Cuadrilla had a strong hold on business and employers, wining, dining and conferencing them after the 2011 Blackpool earthquakes. They even fund a self-styled "North West Industry Task Force" to "independently" speak up for shale.

But now the mood is one of scepticism. Getting on for 300 Lancashire Employers have already signed up to oppose fracking because they realise the threat it poses to existing employers and jobs. National giants like LUSH are backing the campaign against fracking and joining local firms from Accrington to Blackpool and everywhere in between. From travel firms to bespoke glass makers, hi-tech to homecare, hospitality to health and fitness the range is vast and the numbers significant. (see www. RAGfrack for list)

Cuadrilla can only claim to require 11 full time equivalent posts at the proposed fracking site at Roseacre Wood: there are pubs in the area who can top that!

In contrast, the Accommodation and Food Services Sector employs 40,000

PROTECTING INVESTMENT AND JOBS.

The big danger in bringing industry and urbanisation to rural areas west of the A6 is the impact on what we have now, and have had for decades. Agriculture is changing its original attitude which saw no real harm in shale gas development. Now, both the CLA (Countryside and Landowners' Association) and the NFU (National Farmers Union) are warning their members of the possible medium and long term dangers in letting fracking in.

CLA President Harry Robinson warned against "a quick route to profit for private companies". He criticised the government's attitude to other employers stating that the only consideration appeared to be "what the operators want rather than the implications of fracking for landowners and others." - Many, many businesses "sit on the back of the cow", supplying to farms; equipping, transporting, building, maintaining our dairy industry.
- · Clothing, boots, tools, trailers, tractors, slurry tanks, quad bikes, grain merchants, veterinary practices.....the list goes on and on. Someone makes and sells everything

needed to keep farmers farming. If farming takes any kind of dip (see evidence from areas with fracking experience) an economic network will shake, maybe break.

FRACKING ROUND EVERY CORNER?

Cuadrilla have modelled their future plans: 20 sites is low, 40 is medium, 80 is high..... (See Cuadrilla website) **That's sites not wells!! Separate sites**.

Each site can have several wells: drilling 24/7, high decibel fracking, flaring stacks, drilling rigs, four metre high security fences plus the convoys of HGVs and hazardous waste tankers to serve these sites. And check out Cuadrilla's Planning Applications for 184 mini sites (monitoring sites) already submitted to LCC. Each 20x20m site seeks permission for a drill, hard standing, car park, welfare facilities, fencing......

Is mini to maxi a risk? Do you want to take it?

West Sussex Council decided the risks were too high: councillors refused permission to drill and fracking firm Celtique has decided not to contest the decision!!!

How will the amenity value of our area survive fracking sites? Will you see ads like this in holiday brochures in future?

WHAT WILL BE THE IMPACT ON THE VISITOR ECONOMY?

"BARTON MOSS FRACKING:

HIGH LEVELS OF CONTAMINATION FOUND AT SITE, EXPERT TELLS COURT"

"An environmental expert has found "dangerously high" levels of contamination in the earth just outside the fracking test drilling site at Barton Moss a court has heard.The environmental scientist also said he found what he believes could have been drilling mud left at the back of the site. The mud is used in the drilling process.....and it must be disposed of in a controlled way because it is considered potentially hazardous.." A request to access the site to take more samples had been made but the drilling company and landowners "had so far blocked the move."
